And Happy Monday! As always, a shout out to our new members of our PRO community: James, Kerry, Gary, Fabio, Jeffrey, David, Jordan, Alexander, Melissa, Christopher, Rachael, Tom, and Robyn. Welcome to you all and congratulations on taking the next step to getting your show on a stage.

Now, the tip of the week.

Speaking of weeks . . . it has been one heck of a week here, since it was just a touch over a week ago that *Once On This Island* won the Tony and I found myself clutching that award and not even remembering how I got to the stage.

It was all just a blur.

As I think back on it now, and how it happened (I'm a big believer in post-mortem-ing everything I do in my life, from the good to the not-as-good), I came to a conclusion that I wanted to share with you all.

See, I've wanted to stand on that Tony stage since I was 15 years old. 30 years later, I got the chance.

As much as we want things to happen overnight, they just don't. One of my favorite quotes is from Jonathan Larson's sister who accepted his Tony for *Rent* posthumously. When she did, she said, "It took Jonathan 10 years to become an overnight sensation."

In my case, I know that so many of the things I learned over the past 30 years are what helped make last Sunday's event possible.

For example . . . as I said in my Tony speech, I met Stephen Flaherty and Lynn Ahrens on *Ragtime* 20 years ago when I handled their house seats. Did I think I could do more than process ticket orders then? Sure, but I did it and I loved it, and had I not, I never would have met them, and they probably wouldn't have been predisposed to give me the rights to *Once On This Island*.

Or what about my first lead producing gig . . . *Godspell*, which I produced in Circle in the Square. *Godspell* didn't work out financially. And we failed to get a Tony nomination for Best Revival of a Musical.

But I took so many lessons away from that production about producing a show in the round, that I applied to *Once On This Island*.

Takeaways?

- It takes time to get to where we want to get to, but that doesn't mean we won't have smaller victories along the way.
- Something good comes out of every experience you have, which is why you want to have as many experiences as possible.

I know you're impatient. So was I. So AM I (cuz I gotta tell you . . . there's a lot more that I want to do too.)

But it's important to remember to focus on the day-to-day work you have to do, and one day you'll find the dream takes care of itself. And how you got there, will all be just a blur.
